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BARC TRUST: AN INTRODUCTION

The Budget Analysis and Research Centre (BARC) Trust is an independent organization working towards enhancing transparency and accountability in governance through rigorous analysis of the government's policy and budget.

BARC Trust was officially registered as a Trust on 4th March, 2015. It is virtually the new avatar of the Budget Analysis Rajasthan Centre (BARC), which was established by Astha Sansthan in 2003 as an unregistered organization and a part of Astha. The aim of BARC is to analyze the Rajasthan State Government budget, and examine if the commitments made by the government through policy documents, election manifestos, budget speeches and international commitments are matched by adequate financial provisions in the State Budget, and to disseminate the findings through training and publications.

The registration of BARC Trust was needed for two reasons – (a) to assure the independent work of BARC on the long-term, and (b) to formally expand the scope of the work on Social Policy Research and Action by renaming the registered organization as the “Budget Analysis and Research Centre Trust”. There was a desire to build on the solid base laid down by the organization since 2003, and so “Budget Analysis” was retained as a major focus. Budget Analysis is indeed an efficient way to influence social policy, and we can affirm that over the 12 years (2003 – 2015) of the existence of the organization, activists, journalists, people's organizations, elected representatives – and BARC have been successful in doing so! When needed or when the opportunity arises, the Centre also takes up Social Policy Research and trainings to address issues and problems faced not only in Rajasthan, but in other states and areas as well.

BARC has been involved in analyzing the state budget from the perspective of the poor and the marginalized and has been using its analysis to further the issues and concerns of marginalized sections such as Dalits, Tribals, Women and Children. BARC has been working closely with PRIs and ULBs along with the NGOs, POs, media and civil society to create a pool of budgetary information through its research and training activities.

VISION

To work towards a policy environment that ensures rights, justice and well-being for all, especially the deprived and marginalized. BARC Trust works to contribute in the efforts of the larger civil society to create pro people and pro marginalized public policies and budgetary processes.

To simplify complicated budget data and key policy matters for the wider public.

Budget Advocacy

BARC Trust analyses the Union and State budget and conducts pre and post budget advocacy with the government and elected representatives to promote transparent, accountable and participatory governance and a people centric perspective with regards to the preparation and implementation of the budgets.

❖ Pre-Budget Advocacy

Every year, BARC Trust engages in Pre Budget-advocacy for increasing the understanding and participation of people in the budgeting process. The Pre Budget-Advocacy is done with the Rajasthan government by involving Non-Government Organizations (NGOs), Community Based Organizations (CBOs), Unions and Associations functioning across Rajasthan.

It also involves conducting a pre-budget workshop with the Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs) of Rajasthan by giving suggestions and raising demands for the upcoming budget at both the Centre and the State level. A pre-budget consultation with state NGOs and Civil Society is also conducted. BARC Trust participated actively in the pre-budget advocacy on the Union budget with the Union government by the People's Budget Initiative (PBI).

❖ Pre-Budget Consultation with Civil Society:

- For the year 2019-20 the government had presented an interim budget and a full-fledged (modified) budget was presented for the year 2019-20 in July 2019. The government organized a pre-budget consultation June 23, 2019 to seek suggestions from the CSOs. BARC participated in the pre-budget consultation and presented its suggestions.
- **Pre-budget Consultation:** A one-day pre-budget consultation was organised by BARC Trust on January 10, 2020 at the Institute of Development Studies, Jaipur for the state budget 2020-21. About 40 people from various civil society organizations participated in the consultation. The consultation focused on child rights issues like education, child protection, health and nutrition and children of marginalised groups. UNICEF Rajasthan's state head Ms. Isabel Bardem and ex-IAS officer Rajendra Bhanawat participated in the inaugural session. Other sessions were also joined by eminent CSO members. A charter of demands (CoDs) was prepared based on these discussions and presented to the government in, before the presentation of the budget for the year 2020-21 by the state government.
- **Consultation on TSP and SC-SP:** BARC with Action Aid, SR Abhiyan, Rajasthan Adivasi Adhikar Manch (RAAM), AIDMM, CDR and Ambedkar Social Equity and Empowerment Mission

organized a one-day consultation on legislating the TSP and SC-SP in the state. Various state governments have come out with law to implement the sub plans for the Dalits and tribals more effectively in their states. There is a demand from the CSOs to implement the act in the state of Rajasthan. In the consultation it was decided that this should be taken up as a campaign. Draft memorandum of this effect was prepared by BARC Trust and shared with various grass root organisations to submit it to the state government.

- BARC Trust also participated in the **Chief Ministers Pre-budget Consultation** organized to take the suggestions from the CSOs before the presentation of the state budget 2020-21 and presented our suggestions and submitted the Charter of Demands.

❖ **Post Budget Activities**

Budget Analysis

- **Responding to the Budget 2019-20:** The modified budget for the financial year 2019-20 was presented in by the state government in July 2019. The budget was analysed in detail and findings were shared with the media and the CSOs as well as with the elected representatives.
- **Responding to the Budget 2020-21:** The state government presented its Budget for the year 2020-21 on February 2020. After the announcement of the Budget, BARC Trust shared the analysis of the State Budget with the media, researchers, civil society organizations and MLAs. Articles on budget published in the newspaper and views were shared on the TV channels. BARC article and analysis was shared on with the CSOs and social media.



- **Responding to the Union Budget:** The union government also presented its budget for the year 2019-20 in July 2019 and for the year 2020-21 in February 2020. On both occasions BARC came out its analysis of the union budget which was published in newspapers.

Advocacy for Child Budgeting In Rajasthan

With the budget 2020-21, the state government for the first time came with the statement on child budget. BARC Trust has been highlighting the need to have a child budget statement by the state government as part of the state budget. We have also been

assessing allocation made towards children in the state budget of Rajasthan, which is available on BARC Trust's website. Last year we came out with a discussion paper on "Status of Child Budgeting in India and Way Forward for Rajasthan" by Subrat Das of CBGA, New Delhi, which discussed the status of child budgeting and why and how the Rajasthan government should initiate the practice in the state.

Budget Tracking and Research Studies

Educational Rights of Children of Minority Community: As part of the UNICEF supported programme, BARC initiated a process of understanding the issues of education of children of minority community. We came out with a policy brief on Policies and Programmes for Minorities and organized a consultation on the issue of minority education with Madrasa Education Board and the CSOs working on the subject.

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): BARC Trust has been working with the state government towards achieving the SDGs in the state. Earlier a BARC team member worked closely at Centre for SDGs created by the state government in Directorate of Statistics and Economics. This year when the NITI was gearing up to prepare the Voluntary National Report on SDGs to the United Nations, it invited the CSOs from across the country to contribute in the process. The process was supported by the UN CR in India and regional and national consultations were organized by on various themes across the country. BARC Trust participated actively in the process, particularly in cases of two specific themes: 'Religious Minorities' and 'Farmers'.

BARC Trust organised a regional consultation on the issue of '**Minorities and the SDGs**' in Jaipur and contributed to the CSO submission to NITO on the same and participated and make presentation in the National Consultation on the same organized by the Wada na Todo Abhiyan, Indian Social Institute and Institute of Policy Studies and Advocacy and other organisations.

Conferences and Workshops

The following conferences and workshops were conducted during the year 2018-19:

- **Pre-Budget Consultation:** As mentioned above, BARC Trust organized a one-day Pre-Budget consultation on January 10, 2020 with support of UNICEF.
- **Consultation on TSP and SC-SP:** A one day consultation on TSP and SC-SP Legislation was organized on February 4, 2020
- **Consultation on Educational Rights of Children of Minority Community**
- Regional consultation on the issue of '**Minorities and the SDGs**'
- MLA Workshop on State Budget 2020-21 with the elected MLAS
- **Capacity Building and Training:** BARC Trust organised a two- day workshop on Budget and Finances for Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) for the Centre for Advocacy and Research (CFAR) team in Ajmer.

Collaboration and Networking

BARC has always worked in collaboration with the various state level networks and organizations, such as the **Right to Food Campaign, SuchnaevamRozgarAdhikarAbhiyan**etc. There have been a significant number of participants from state NGOs in BARC's pre-budget consultations and other programmes. During the year 2019-20, BARC collaborated with many organizations for conducting various research studies and interventions, as mentioned above. Apart from this, BARC Trust also participated in various meetings, seminars and advocacy initiatives undertaken by various organizations.

MAKAAM (MahilaKisanAdhikarManch):

We have also participated in the activities of MAKAAM, a national network of organizations working with women farmers and farm workers.

Responding to theCOVID-19 Pandemic

Towards the end of the year when the Novel Corona pandemic broke out and a 21- day lockdown was announced to curb the spread of the pandemic. The lockdown created major crisis for the poor people, the daily wagers and the migrant workers. The CSOs in Rajasthan came together to provide support to the affected people. The central and the state governments also announced various relief measures. BARC prepared a summary of the relief measures and shared with the CSOs all the CSOs through email and WhatsApp. It has also been uploaded on the website. It was again timely updated when new measures were announced.

BARC AS A RESOURCE CENTRE

As stated earlier, one of the roles that BARC Trust assumes is to be a Resource Centre for the NGOs/POs, as well as for the journalists, MLAs and the public at large. The Centre was set up to provide high quality research data and analysis to support advocacy efforts. During the year 2019-20, BARC has provided support to various organizations. Some of the organizations which requested for specific budget data and information include CfAR, Action Aid, SR Abhiyan, JSA and other Civil Society Organizations.

Various news articles quoted BARC's analysis of the state budget in their reports including in the newspapers like Times of India, Daily news, Dainik Bhaskar etc. BARC members also published their articles in the new papers.

Shrinking budget hits social sector

Jaipur: The budgetary allocation in social sector has either remained stagnant or recorded a fall in the state. This has affected the growth in social sector.

The budget for the social sector has gone down with every passing year from 2015-16. Figures say that the budget on social sector, which includes nine heads, was 49.60% in 2015-16. It reduced to 45.54% 2019-20 (Interim budget). The fall out of the decline is hitting the beneficiaries of social sector which includes nine board categories.

The categories are health and family welfare, education, sports art and culture, urban development, urban housing, water and sanitation, welfare of SC, ST and OBCs, labour welfare, social welfare and nutrition, rural development.

Nisar Ahmed of Budget Analysis Rajasthan Centre (BARC) says that curtailing budget is an alarming trend.

mortality rate, low learning outcomes, high drop outs and nutrition to name a few are way behind the state average. It has also dampened the prospects of state in achieving the committed sustainable development goals. If the trend continues, it will impact the social development of the state," said Ahmed.

The budget allocation in the social sector was Rs 6,5236.33 crore in 2015-16 which was 49.60% of the total budget, while the Interim budget by Ashok Gehlot government was Rs 9,8748.68 crores which is 45.0% of the total budget.

Chhaya Pachauli, an activist working for right to health in Rajasthan, said that budget in state under health and family planning was Rs 8,703.36 crore in 2015-16, while in 2019-20, it was Rs 13,034.63 crore.

"This is an area which requires major attention from the government. If the budgetary allocation remains low, state will continue to lose out on capitalizing its human resource," said Pachauli.

Website:

BARC Trust's website (www.barctrust.org) was created to help citizens and other organizations to find information about Rajasthan state's budget and public policies with a pro-poor and pro-marginalized peoples' perspective. As a centre for budget and policy related information, the site gives an overview of Rajasthan's socio-economic status, and provides a simplified understanding of the state's budget and policies over the years.

The website is structured to reflect our strategic focus. Rajasthan's budget has various sections such as budget documents, simplified budget data and disclosure of budget which are directly accessible from the home page. Apart from "About Us", which introduces the visitors to the

Trust's Vision, Mission and Objectives, the site has sections on "Rajasthan Budget Data Simplified", which presents the Rajasthan government's budget data in a simpler form and the "Panchayat Budget" which introduces the visitors to the Trust's work with the Panchayats in the Tonk district of Rajasthan. The section on "Nutrition in Rajasthan" introduces the status of nutrition in the state, while the publication section provides all our publications online.

The Website has been updated after the budget 2019-20 and 2019-21. Towards the end of the year when the Novel Corona epidemic broke out and a lockdown was announced to curb the epidemic

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS

The state government has started coming out with the Child Budget Statement, which has been one of the BARC's demands from the government. It is yet another step towards the transparency in budget and a tool to monitor the realization of the rights of the children.

Campaign for Right to Health Act: The ruling party in its manifesto had promised to come with a Right to Health act. BARC with Jan SwasthyaAbhiyan (JSA) campaigned for such an act to be passed in the state. We had meetings with the Health Secretary and the Health Minister in this regard. The issue was also raised in the charter of demands prepared by BARC Trust and pre-budget consultations organized by the government. The state government has reiterated its commitment to pass such an act in the state.

Comments on Draft Education Policy: The union government's Ministry of Human Resource Development came out with the draft Education Policy 2019 and invited suggestions from the people. BARC contributed to the comments prepared by the CSOs on the draft Education Policy 2019 which was submitted to the MHRD.

BARC Trust also participated in the national consultation on 'Farmers and SDGs' organized by Wada naTodoAbhiyan and CECOEDECON in Jaipur and contributed in the CSO submission to the NITI on the issue farmers and SDGs. BARC's contribution focused on the issue of landless farmers.

UNICEF's Marketplace: BARC was one of the eight organisations selected to participate in the Marketplace organized by UNICEF, Rajasthan. Country representative of UNICEF, India visited the BARC's stall in the Marketplace.

In December 2019, extremely distressing news of large numbers of children dying in Kota and then other children's hospitals of Rajasthan was published in various newspapers. BARC Trust came out with an analysis of linking the deaths of children with the lack of infrastructure, equipment and other medical facilities in the state hospitals which in turn is linked to the lower health budget in the country and the state. An article was published on the News click website and later various newspapers quoted BARC's analysis while reporting the crisis.

The fact- finding team visited the hospitals and families of the deceased children and organized a press conference on the issues.

CONCLUSION
